In September let us remember

two outstanding people who gave their all so that children could be educated.

Rev Dr. John Anderson Graham accompanied by Mrs. Katherine Graham came out to India as a Scottish Presbyterian minister to work in the Darjeeling and Kalimpong hills.

It was the presence of children in the tea gardens in the Dooars that caught his attention. They were children of British and Indian parents and his heart went out to them.

In 1900 Dr Graham established the Homes to care for such children. A nursery, kindergarten, school, a farm, a bakery, a small hospital and cottages for both boys and girls was built by Dr. Graham with generous donations from people in authority. The children were cared for, given a home, a training and then sent out into the world to make a mark in life. After a hundred years the work of caring, nurturing and training still continues. Old and grateful students acknowledge the help that the Homes has given them in their formative years. Committees around the world support this work.

Mrs. Graham began schools in the local language for girls and began a centre for women to learn handicrafts. Today the Kalimpong Girls School is celebrating a glorious 125 years of its service to the girl child. In this month of September the birthday of the Homes we remember the labour of love of this outstanding couple.



The other person we give thanks in September is Major General Claude Martin.



We give thanks to God for this great

soul, for his self-made life, his prowess as a soldier and multifaceted gifts and the gift he has left to us in the legacy of the schools of Lucknow, Kolkata and Lyons. We also thank God for the many generations of children that have benefited from these schools. Major General Claude Martin came from a humble background yet by his own self effort has left us this legacy through his writings, buildings and educational institutions.

I would like to bring here the role the mother of Claude Martin played in his life. His mother told him "son, you are enlisting as a soldier in the army but I want you to come home 'in a carriage'". Claude Martin's ideas on education are reflected in the following extract from his writings:"I have read a lot, pen in hand, often under difficult conditions, and I know the value of the first rudiments inculcated by the parson of St. Saturnin. That is why I divide my fortune in two.

"I also want to give the children of both Lyon and India, the instruction which I received with so much difficulty. I want to make it easy for young people to get access to knowledge, specially the sciences."

Till the age of 16, Claude Martin studied in his local parish school and he excelled in physics and mathematics. Martin began his career as a soldier and remained essentially a soldier throughout his life, a fighter and a strategist which explains his extraordinary success in life in spite of tremendous odds.

Today we must encourage our children not only to become good soldiers in the forces but also to become good soldiers in the fight against evil. The forces of iniquity are not only in the world around us but are within us. Our minds and emotions are the ground of warfare where we must fight and win the battle against pride, lust, jealousy, greed, hatred, gluttony, sloth and selfishness.

Today we give thanks for Claude Martin who struggled hard, to learn, to do and having done all to leave his wealth so children of future generations could learn and do.
